As I prepared *PrepNotes* this month, it was difficult for me to settle on a topic that I felt would be informative, thought provoking and beneficial to all. In these tough economic times, I would like to extend a few words of encouragement to you when it seems many try to only look at the dark side of things.

I can assure you that working with young people, their families, and teachers through this unsettling time is both a challenge and a blessing.

Do you often find yourself needing to make decisions when you do not know all the facts? Sometimes you do the research, but still there are those unanswered questions that prey on your mind. I oftentimes find myself wishing that I could see the future as I make tough decisions.

We are constantly reminded of the economic situation in the news today. I have attended several professional development sessions on financial sustainability in our schools. This, of course, is a top priority for our Chief Financial Officer, Denny Britt. He has the charts, projections and educational expertise to provide options for consideration. He is well connected to others with similar positions in education and other industries that have walked through these situations. I am confident in his ability to provide the very best understanding to address the “elephant in the room.”

Today I share with you the facts that I do know:

- The service that Jackson Prep provides in this community as a viable option for the best secondary education cannot be ignored.
- A year ago the board approved a revised mission statement: *“Jackson Preparatory School inspires and challenges students toward academic, athletic and artistic excellence, instills personal integrity through biblical values and equips students to pursue lives of distinction in service to society.”* As decisions are made by the school, we will be diligent in remaining true to our mission.
- The most important “slice of the pie” in quality education is exceptional faculty. I use the term “faculty” to include all that are part of the team employed by the school to ensure the very best experience for students. We will continue to seek superior faculty who are experts in their fields of study and who understand the importance of knowing your child.
- The pool of student applicants for next year is strong. We have had many parents and students visit the school through our Prep Preview programs. As we approach February 1, the registration

deadline for enrollment, we are encouraged by the response of our prospective families.

- We understand that some of our families are having financial difficulties because of employment layoffs and significant market changes in demand for specific products. To those parents, I want to encourage you to seek information about the flex tuition program by contacting Wanda Park at 601-939-8611. As a school, we cannot address lifestyle choices, but we want to work with you to address real need and ensure physical and emotional stability in the life of your teenager as you address unanticipated changes in your financial situation.
- As a school, we are carefully reviewing our programs to ensure that we continue to offer full service to students, address the issue of “sacred cows,” are “green smart” in the use of resources and explore other revenue sources.

I am aware that many of our parents have not suffered financially. If this is the case with your family, I want to ask you to please make Prep one of your top two choices in charitable giving. An investment in education is a lifetime gift. Our school is dependent on the Annual Fund to bridge the gap between tuition revenue and the operating budget, which ensures instructional and co-curricular enhancements and facility improvements. We have no delusions about the challenges we now face in the area of fundraising. In April, there will be an expanded solicitation from the Annual Fund to ensure wide-scale participation. Every gift makes a difference in the lives of the students in the school. I also thank those of you who made contributions to the school at the end of the calendar year. Payments on capital campaign pledges saved the school money by delaying the need to borrow against our loan.

In closing, I want to thank all of our families for making the financial sacrifice to send your children to Prep. I do not know what the future holds for our financial markets and investments. I do know that as parents you want a secure future for your child. I do know the importance of a Prep education. I do know the “One” who knows the future. I remain committed to walking through these uncertain times, facing the challenges, and making the tough decisions as together we face the opportunities of the future.

EIGHTH & NINTH GRADE STANDARDIZED TESTING

Ninth grade students will take the PSSS (Preliminary SAT Scoring Service) test on Thursday, February 12. Eighth grade students took the *Explore* achievement test (which is a precursor for the PLAN and the ACT) on Wednesday, January 28. Test results will be mailed home in the Spring.

SUBJECT CHOICE SELECTION FOR 2009-10

Subject choice selection for the 2009-10 academic year will occur in February. Seventh and eighth grade students will receive their subject choice cards during homeroom the week of February 16-20. The subject choice cards are to be completed and returned to each student's homeroom teacher by the date printed on the card. Ninth graders will receive their subject choice cards the week of February 9-13.

APPLICATIONS FOR 2009-10 HONORS PROGRAM

Information regarding the Honors program will be mailed to seventh and eighth grade students the first week of February. Seventh grade students will have the opportunity to apply for Honors Algebra I and/or Honors Physical Science for the upcoming year. Eighth and ninth grade students will be able to apply for Honors English or Honors Physical Science. Informational meetings for parents and students interested in these programs will be held in February after school in the Guyton Lyceum. These meetings will be open to all interested parents and students, but attendance at these meetings is not required for parents or students interested in applying for any honors program. The dates of these meetings will be included in the letters that are sent home and will also appear in the daily junior high announcements.

SEVENTH GRADE ACT PREPARATION WORKSHOP

On February 6, all seventh graders who signed up to take the February ACT through the Duke Talent Identification Program (TIP) will meet in the Guyton Lyceum during fourth period for a preparation workshop. Students are reminded to eat lunch during homeroom period and to **bring all necessary materials that Duke sent them to the workshop.**

ALA-LA-MISS TESTING

On February 17, a select group of seventh and eighth graders will take the ALA-LA-MISS math test during either first or second period. They will compete with students from Alabama, Louisiana, and Mississippi. Awards will be given to students with the highest scores at the Junior High Honors Forums in May.

MATHCOUNTS

On February 24, Prep will compete in the Mississippi School for Math and Science (MSMS) annual math tournament in Columbus. Prep will take eight students from each grade (8-12) to compete in their current math area and on ciphering against over 700 students from 25 schools. Prep has won this competition for more than ten consecutive years. Good luck, math students!

New candidates for membership in the National Junior Honor Society will be inducted in the Jackson Prep Chapter on February

SCHOLARSHIP REPORTING

Scholarship acceptances will be announced at Class Day. Monetary values of scholarship offers and acceptances are for school statistics only and will not be announced.

FINANCIAL AID FOR COLLEGE

Parents of seniors seeking financial aid for college should submit the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) online at www.fafsa.ed.gov as soon as possible. This is the first step in applying for financial aid. Some schools also require the CSS Profile. Please check the information from each school to which your child is applying.

TRANSCRIPTS

Seven-semester transcripts were mailed in late January to all out-of-state and private selective colleges and universities to which seniors have applied and continue to have interest, and to public in-state colleges upon request by the student, parent, or college. Final transcripts will be mailed after graduation to the college or university in which the senior will enroll.

MTAG AND MESG APPLICATIONS

All seniors should apply for the Mississippi Tuition Assistance Grant (MTAG) and/or the Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant (MESG). The application is available online at www.ihl.state.ms.us. GPA information will be sent electronically from the school to the IHL office which administers these programs. ACT scores will be sent directly from the testing agency for all students, but students using SAT score for eligibility will need to provide a copy of their SAT score report to the IHL financial aid office. There is no need to request transcripts for this program. More information is available on the college counseling page of the website.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The dates for summer school at Prep are June 1-July 10. Brochures and registration forms have been mailed to each student in grades seven through eleven. Early registration is encouraged because some classes fill up quickly.

Jackson Prep's two premier showchoirs, *Revéillon* and *Fusion*, are busily preparing for their first showchoir competition. *Revéillon*, meaning "first or awakening," is the high school showchoir that features 32 singers and dancers. These performers will be accompanied by members of the Prep band and a student set crew.



Fusion is the junior high showchoir, which consists of 34 singers and dancers. Showchoirs on the junior high level are accompanied by a show CD, which is produced by a University of Southern Mississippi band.

The showchoir students met after school and early evenings during the month of January to prepare the twenty-minute competition shows, complete with choreography, vocals, costumes, sets, and props. departmental spotlight

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness..." writes Charles Dickens about the years leading up to the French Revolution, and perhaps the same may be said of adolescence. Students and teachers are (and will) be reading and discussing some amazing books this semester at Prep – not only *A Tale of Two Cities* (tenth grade), but *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* (eleventh), *The Canterbury Tales* (twelfth), *The Odyssey* (ninth), *To Kill a Mockingbird* (eighth), *And Then There Were None* (seventh), and *Esperanza Rising* (sixth). Hopefully, reading these books will count among the "best" and not the "worst" of times for students. We English teachers do what we do because we love these books and want our students to gain as much pleasure and insight from them as we have. Often enough, we hear the heated discussions or impassioned testimonials that let us know they really do like them. No one can appreciate a book that he or she hasn't read, though, and we spend a lot of energy pleading with students to read the book itself instead of some shorter, simpler, and much less interesting substitute.

Our students are busy and social, and they are accustomed to the instant gratification of electronic media. Reading is slow, solitary, and quiet, and therefore not immediately attractive to many adolescents. Nonetheless, it remains an essential part of the education we offer at Prep, and for good reasons. According to a 1988 study cited by Mark Bauerlein in *The Dumbest Generation* (2008), almost any type of print media, including children's books, contains more complex vocabulary than any type of oral media, including both television and conversation by college grads. The result, Bauerlein explains, is that "a low-reading, high-viewing childhood and adolescence prevent a person from handling relatively complicated texts, not just professional discourses but civic and cultural media" as well (130). And those standardized tests that cause us so much anxiety? Not surprisingly, it is the readers among our students who score well on them. More than any quantifiable benefit, however, the books we treasure and teach offer us the opportunity to live other lives, to empathize with those far removed from us in time and space, to understand ourselves and our world from a different perspective. In short, they remind us of what it means to be human – in whatever century or time of life we find ourselves. So here is an English teacher's plea: help your children to value the slow, solitary, and quiet pursuit of experience and insight that the greatest books offer. Their lives will be richer for it, not to mention their vocabularies and test scores!

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The goal of the science department is to give each student a broad range of scientific knowledge to equip them for further studies and to be scientifically literate adults. Accordingly, the Prep curriculum offers a broad range of courses, providing a strong fundamental knowledge of science. In addition, every course in the department has a strong laboratory component appropriate for the level of the student and the subject content. It is strongly recommended that students take advantage of the breadth of the curriculum available, taking the equivalent of three years of life science courses (Biology and Earth Science) and three years of physical science courses (Chemistry and Physics).

The decision on whether to choose an honors or college prep course can be made each year based on the student's interest, performance and aptitude. Seventh grade students will have an opportunity to enter the honors track and take a special course in eighth grade which combines the college prep courses from eighth and ninth grades. This early entry allows room for an advanced placement course in the senior year. Throughout the

Prep curriculum, the overall content is the same in the honors and college prep courses. However, the honors courses move faster and delve deeper into the subject being studied, while requiring more critical analysis of the applicable concepts. Students who have a strong interest in science should consult with their teacher if they are considering an honors course for next year.

This is a good time to review the general sequence of the curriculum for the science department since your student will soon be choosing courses for next year. If you have any questions about which course is best for your child next year, please consult with your child's current science teacher or counselor.
